






Why is vocabulary important?

As we like to say on the podcast, you can't comprehend what you don't understand, and that starts with vocabulary. Vocabulary is part of the language comprehension strand in Scarborough's Reading Rope. Students may read accurately and fluently, but if they don't know what words mean, they can't make sense of what they read. The more words kids know, the more they understand, and the more they want to keep reading. That's the power of vocabulary instruction.

Vocabulary

Here are three big takeaways about vocabulary instruction straight from the voices of researchers and real classrooms:



Make it Stick

Hearing a word once will not do the trick. Kids need a routine that brings the word back again and again: introducing it, defining it, talking about it, and using it in different contexts. Think kid-friendly definitions, meaningful examples, and plenty of chances to play with the word.



Teach Word Parts

Roots, prefixes, and suffixes open doors to entire families of words. When kids learn that struct means "build," words like construct, instructor, and destruction suddenly click into place. Morphology gives them tools that grow with them.



Choose the Right Words

Tier 2 words make the biggest impact. These are high-utility words that appear across many texts and stretch just beyond what students already know (like reluctant or predict). Teaching these words gives students real traction for comprehension.



Together, these practices help students not only learn new words but also use them in reading, writing, and conversation. The episodes in this guide highlight ideas from researchers and classroom teachers, including Blythe Anderson, Lyn Stone, and educators from grades 1–5. From vocabulary talk moves to morphology, you will find strategies you can try tomorrow.







Why Morphology Matters for Word Reading and More

with Melissa Orkin and Alex Osburn



Melissa Orkin and Alex Osburn remind us that multisyllabic word reading is about understanding as much as decoding. As Melissa explains, "Morphology bridges decoding and comprehension." By grades 3–6, most new words are morphologically complex, built from roots, prefixes, and suffixes. Recognizing these parts helps students unlock meaning and pronunciation. Alex shares a quick routine using a teacher-led Frayer Model to teach prefixes, showing how morphology deepens both word reading and understanding.
